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

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### PREFACE.

A HOMOGOPATHIC DIRECTORY is something more than a mere List of Addresses and Qualifications of Physicians and Surgeons practising Homogopathy.

It is a *List of witnesses* in favour of that Reform which Homeopathy has introduced into the Art and Science of Medicine.

It affords the strongest evidence in favour of *Homeepathy*, as a practical Science, to which it is possible to refer, when it is considered that each and all of these Professors, Lecturers, Medallists, Physicians, Surgeons, and Apothecaries, have, after full study and careful experiment in Hospitals, Dispensaries and Clinics, abandoned the older system of Medicine, and given their adhesion to the new.

The testimony thus afforded to the great body of the profession demands, and ultimately must receive, its attention. It is a silent appeal to them, as individuals, to give Homocopathy a personal investigation. It is a "prima facie" evidence that Homocopathy is a safe and legitimate practice. Were it otherwise, so large a body of registered practitioners would

not, year after year, remain its devoted adherents, using no other means to meet the acutest forms of maladies; and it shows, by their successful professional career, that they meet with at least an average amount of victory over our common enemy, Disease.

We would particularly refer professional inquirers to the List of Members of the British Homœopathic Society, as showing that many of these gentlemen have for a great number of years practised Homœopathy. Many of them were, indeed, practising Homœopathy for several years previously even to their joining this Society.

### EDITOR'S NOTICE.

THE present Directory professes to give the addresses of every recognised practitioner of Homeopathy in the British Islands. In order to ensure as perfect accuracy as possible, a printed circular has been forwarded to every Physician and Surgeon who was known to be practising as a Homeopathist. With each circular was included a stamped envelope with the name and address of the Editor, which the practitioner was requested to return by next post. Those who have never undertaken a task such as ours have no idea of the trouble and care it involves, or we think all would have given the little mite of help, thus indicated, towards the preparation of our Directory. Many of our friends responded immediately, as requested, for which they receive our warmest thanks; but a very considerable number delayed week after week, and nearly one hundred gave no response till circulars and stamped envelopes were a second time posted to them.

We advert to this subject in the hope that when our next Directory is in preparation, our correspondents will assist in lightening our labours (as well as in diminishing the expense which their delay throws upon the publishers) by responding to our first appeal. They should bear in mind that every inquiry costs twopence in postage alone, in addition to the delay and trouble it involves. We have to thank numerous correspondents for information they have most kindly afforded us, by sending us the names of those physicians and surgeons in their neighbourhood who have recently embraced Homocopathy; of those who have removed to other localities, and of those who have died. Also for the information as to the population and salubrity, &c., of the towns and districts in which they are resident.

Many of our correspondents have sent us suggestions for which we are greatly obliged; some we have adopted, but others we have not been able to follow in our present edition. So far as we have found it possible we have acceded to suggestions which have appeared to us to express the wish of any large or influential majority. For instance, it has been very strongly and numerously urged that the Registered and Unregistered practitioners should not appear in the same list. To this wish we have acceded, though it entails some hardship upon a few most honorable men who hold degrees which are registrable. We have, however, marked these degrees prominently, so that the public may easily distinguish between those who have obtained their unregistered degrees by following the usual curriculum of study, and those who have entered the profession by unusual bye-ways.

We have also introduced a new feature, in dividing each practitioner's degrees, or honours, into those which have been registered and which are recognised by law, and into those which are simply honorary. This will enable the public still further to analyse the professional status of each individual.

Before concluding this notice we would wish to remark that the following list does not include the names of every practitioner of Homeopathy. In some cases we have been requested not to publish the names of new converts, who, although fully persuaded of the truth of Homeopathy, are not yet prepared to avow their belief openly. While we think thos gentlemen are wrong in thus withholding their public testimon; as to the truth of Homeopathy, we cannot severely censure a course which the illiberality of the Allopathists has forced upon those members of our common profession.

It will be seen that we have preferred to give the list of our practitioners alphabetically throughout, not dividing that part which treats of addresses, hours of consultation and degrees, into London and Provincial lists. We think the Local list subjoined sufficient for the purpose of segregation.

In our present edition we have given no information as to Continental or American practitioners. To make such information perfect, a far greater time and expense would be required than are, at present, at our disposal. Among the other new features introduced we show those towns and districts which are yet unsupplied with Homeopathic practitioners, and which thus present excellent openings. We have restricted ourselves to towns of more than 10,000 inhabitants, except in the case of watering places. In many large towns a very influential Homœopathic clientèle exists willing to guarantee a fair minimum income of £200 to £300 a year to good respectable men having a fair knowledge of Homeopathy. We hope the knowledge of this urgent demand for Homoopathic practitioners will induce those of our number who have sons to bring them into the profession, and to use their influence with their patients and friends to educate their sons as Homœopathic practitioners wherever they show any leaning towards medicine as a profession.

We have not added a list of books and pamphlets to the names of their authors in the Address List, but have appended a list of works upon Homœopathy compiled from the catalogues of our principal publishers.

### HOM COPATHY:

### ITS RELATION TO SPECIFIC MEDICINE.\*

THE history of Cinchona Bark has so direct a bearing upon the subsequent discovery of the Homeopathic art of healing, that we may fairly devote a few lines to this page of medical history.

Peruvian Bark was brought into notice by the Countess of Cinchon (hence it derives its name of Cinchona), the wife of the Viceroy of Peru, who had been cured, by its means, of an obstinate intermittent fever.

The virtues of this bark were not discovered by men of science, nor even by the accidental experiments of physicians, but by the untutored savages of South America, far off on the slopes of the Cordilleras, and was by them given to the white men who had slaughtered their fathers and usurped their country.

The Bark was brought to Europe by the Jesuits, who had acquired a knowledge of its virtues. Its introduction was immediately opposed by the *orthodox* members of the medical profession. This was in the year 1639. The Cinchona bark (sometimes also called Peruvian bark, or Jesuit's bark) was

first fairly tried in the Roman States by order of Pope Innocent X. The trial completely proved its efficacious power.

We are told that it was coldly received by orthodox physicians, and totally repudiated by Protestants. This very odd jumble of religious as well as medical opposition may have been partly owing to its name, as from its introducers it was termed Jesuit's bark.

However, fourteen years after its first trial in Europe, i. e. in 1653, the Cinchona bark was introduced into England.

The two men who were the first to bring bark into renown in England were Cambridge men—Dr. Brady, professor of medicine, and Richard Talbor, who was an apothecary, and afterwards (in 1663) was a scholar in St. John's College.

To Talbor, more than to any other man in Europe, was the recognition of the powers of bark due. Contemporary physicians called him a "miserable quack" and a "debauched apothecary's apprentice;" but he possessed the acuteness to appreciate bark at its true value, and to apply it in the "Art of Healing" to such effect, that he cured, by the use of this newly-introduced and much-abused drug, diseases which had, up to this time, been among the most fatal in our land.

Cromwell died of ague about this time. His physicians refused to administer bark to him. It had not yet become orthodox.

But Richard Talbor continued to enforce the virtues of the Cinchona, and it led him on to wealth and fame. In 1680 he was summoned to Paris. The Dauphin (son of Louis XIV) was dangerously ill with ague. Talbor spoke confidently as to his power to cure him, promising to answer with his own life for that of the Prince. The Court physicians were furious, especially Daguin their chief. Talbor accomplished the Dauphin's restoration to health, and Louis gave

him 2000 louis d'or for his secret, beside an annual pension of 2000 francs. On his return to England, Charles II knighted him, and he died full of honours and riches.

The introduction of Cinchona bark marked an era in the true "Art of Healing." The incalculable value of this discovery is apt to be forgotten in our own age, when ague has become a comparatively rare disease. The battle has been fought and won. A bare consideration of the number of lives saved will show us part of the debt we owe to the discovery of bark and its strong principle quinine. The relief it has afforded to suffering humanity, in the shortening and curing what was often a life-long disease, of a peculiarly depressing character, it is beyond our power to do more than faintly indicate.

In seven years before the use of bark, i.e. from 1629 to 1636, there died 10,484 people of ague; but as these figures, alone, fail to produce a correct impression on the mind, I may state that the deaths from ague were equal to nearly one-fourth of the whole annual mortality from all diseases. One hundred years later, we find that, in seven years, i.e. from 1734 to 1742, when bark had come fairly into use, the deaths from ague were only 31, or 1 in 3757 of the whole mortality.\*

Now, if the discovery of one true specific has thus reduced the mortality in the one disease to which it is specific, it is evident that one chief duty of physicians ought to be to seek for the discovery of specifics for the cure of other well-ascertained diseases.

The untutored savage in the wilds of South America, who

discovered the use of bark, has done more for the salvation of human life and the prevention of human misery than all the physicians had done for 2000 years, from the days of Hippocrates down to the middle of the seventeenth century.

We must now pass over 150 years, during which many physicians had sought, and vainly sought, to discover why bark cured ague. There were theories in abundance, but they were all fruitless. The key which should discover why bark cured ague would open the hidden arcana of cure for all other diseases. But the search was fruitless, because men were still bound, more than they knew, by the Galenism and Hippocratism which went before them. So some contented themselves with fanciful explanations, while others were content with the simple fact, and ceased even to look for its rationale.

Tessier well says, that "Nature only answers when interrogated, and only answers correctly those who know how to interrogate her." The physicians who failed to discover the law of specifics, failed because they did not know how to interrogate nature.

To Hahnemann, a German physician, was reserved the honour of this discovery, which is fraught with greater practical blessings than any other which has preceded it in the "Art of Healing."

Hahnemann was born at Meissen, in Saxony, on the 10th of April, 1755. The limits of our address do not allow us to give even a slight sketch of his life. In a recent 'Cyclopædia' his character is thus summed up:—"Hahnemann is universally acknowledged to have displayed great genius, industry, and erudition. Jean Paul Richter calls him 'a prodigy of philosophy and learning.' He was a man of unblemished

purity of morals, and his life, as well as his writings, was characterised by strong natural piety."\*

Hahnemann was a painstaking and conscientious physician who, by much study and long travel, had striven to perfect himself in his art. Having employed to the uttermost the opportunities he had enjoyed of seeing disease under its varied types in many parts of Europe; having an intimate acquaintance with all that had been written on medicine in his own country and time; having himself translated numerous standard works on medicine from other languages, Hahnemann felt nothing but disappointment at the poverty of the means of cure which existed, and despair at the chaos which the Materia Medica of his time presented.

In the year 1790 (he being then thirty-five years of age), Hahnemann was engaged in translating Cullen's 'Materia Medica.' He was struck with the unsatisfactory attempts, in that work, to explain the action of cinchona bark in ague.

Here was an undoubted fact to work upon. BARK CURED AGUE.

It was as if a medical Archimedes had suddenly found a fulcrum on which to rest his lever. Hahnemann at once saw that the reason why men had been foiled, in their attempts to explain the action of the drug, was, that they had never observed what were the positive and natural effects of the drug upon the healthy constitution. He determined to experiment upon himself, and, while in perfect health, took several doses of powdered bark, in all amounting to half an ounce.

In a few days he experienced all the symptoms of ague. He had interrogated nature rationally, and had received a correct answer.

Bark, which cured ague when present, caused a disease similar to ague when administered to the healthy.

This suggested to Hahnemann's mind that it was possible that every other medicine was equally a specific for some disease, and that the key to discover the specific curative powers of a medicine was first to discover its poisonous power.

This supposition he put to the proof. By careful experiment he examined the powers of nearly one hundred drugs, and then, as opportunity offered, gave them to patients who were suffering from diseases whose symptoms corresponded to those which he had seen caused by the drugs.

The result fully answered his most sanguine anticipations. The law of *specifics* stood revealed, and he expressed it by the formula "Similia similibus curantur."

Let us pause for a moment to recapitulate.

The one medicine of which Allopaths had reason to be most proud was Bark. It was almost, if not altogether, the only medicine which they possessed that fulfilled the aspirations of Bacon and Robert Boyle; for, while it cured a "well-ascertained disease," it left the patient uninjured, if given in moderately small doses.

The Allopaths derived their knowledge of the virtues of Bark from the chance powers of observation of a South-American savage. For 150 years it remained almost, if not quite, their sole specific medicine, during which time they remained as profoundly ignorant of the reason why it cured ague, as was the savage who first used it.

Hahnemann discovered why Bark cured ague; and from this discovery sprung a knowledge of the Homeopathic law.

That which the majority of physicians had been content to leave as an unexplained fact, was now rationally explained. Bark cured ague because it was Homeopathic to ague.

This discovery of Hahnemann's was as much opposed by the profession at large, as we have seen that Bark was opposed by the physicians of the 17th century.

If the one specific was received with such active ill-will, can we wonder that the discovery of 100 should have excited an angry professional storm 100 times greater? In fact, so great has been the hurricane excited by this multitude of new truths introduced by Hahnemann, that we are not yet free from its fitful gusts, though they already are slowly lulling under the calming force inherent to Great Truths.

Time forbids our consideration of the many precautions, by which Hahnemann sought to avoid all possibility of error, in this examination into the positive effects of drugs; those who are interested in the subject will find them detailed in 'Hahnemann's Organon,' and in his 'Lesser Writings.'

We must content ourselves by saying that every possible source of error was seen and avoided; and that Hahnemann's labour, in conducting this truly gigantic series of experiments, was astounding from its immensity. Every deviation from health, of mind, or body, occurring in an experimenter, after taking an experimental dose, was carefully and accurately recorded, however trivial it might seem.

Homeopathy, then, is the medicine of specifics.

What Quinine and Bark are to ague, such Aconite is to inflammation, Belladonna is to sore-throat and smooth scarlatina, Bryonia to one form of rheumatism, &c., &c. But Hahnemann's discovery went further than this. Bark and Quinine do not cure every case of ague. He discovered the reason for this. Some forms of ague differ from others in a very marked degree, and it is only those agues to which Bark-poisoning is similar which yield to Bark and Quinine. Those, whose

symptoms present peculiarities, require medicines which, by their poisonous dose, produce similar peculiarities.

Hahnemann's system discovers the specifics which will cure those agues that refuse to yield to Quinine.\*

So with regard to other diseases, it is not a coarse and unscientific generalization (such as that which satisfies those who now consider themselves "orthodox") that satisfies the follower of Hahnemann.

It is not enough to call a disease ague and give Quinine. We must inquire whether, in all its symptoms, it corresponds to Quinine. Nor is it enough, in rheumatism, to give Bryonia. We must inquire whether the pains simulate those caused by Bryonia? and if not, we must seek some other medicine which more accurately corresponds to the disease.

This discovery of Hahnemann's must produce great results. It will tend to give all other diseases, at least, the same degree of cure and relief which Bark has been shown to have induced in ague.

Scarlet fever, for example, is wonderfully reduced in its

The patient had four fits of ague every day, coming on with perfect regularity at nine, at one, at five, and at nine. Quinine, Arsenic, and many other remedies had been tried in vain under Allopathic care. I had recently read Dr. Casanova's admirable experiments with Cedron. His provings showed that the characteristic feature of CEDRON was that its symptoms recurred with perfect regularity as to time. Hence I gave Cedron, which induced a rapid cure.

More recently a patient consulted me about an ague in which the fits came on at night; the different stages were not well marked; fever, chills and perspirations were mingled, but there was heat and constant dryness of the tongue and throat. Quinine and other Allopathic medicines failed to relieve him, but a few doses of Arsenicum in the 3rd dilution cured him completely. His own expression was that an hour after the first dose he began to feel better.

mortality by the Homeopathic method; and so also is inflammation of the lungs, and indeed so are all other acute diseases.

To so great an extent is this true, that the opponents to Homeopathy make it a cause for a senseless sneer, which, rightly interpreted, becomes a high testimonial to the superiority of Homeopathic practice. It is this: they say, that "Homeopaths very seldom meet with really acute cases of disease." This assertion is grounded on the very few deaths, from acute disease, which are met with in Homeopathic practice.

Now, let the opponent ask himself, "Why do Homcopaths have less acute disease than is common among the orthodox?" Is it from some miraculous interposition in their favour? Is it that Homcopathic patients are not plagued like other men? Or is it not, rather, that their system better fulfils the true indications of the Healing Art, and cures "safely, quickly, and pleasantly?"

If he refuse to admit the last, as the true explanation, he accuses his own system of causing the acute disease that is so common under his hands, according to his own testimony, but is less frequently found in Homeopathic practice.

We must leave our opponent on the horns of the dilemma on which he has impaled himself.

Subordinate to Hahnemann's great discovery of the law of specific medicines, he laid it down as a rule to give only one medicine at a time, by which he struck a blow at the mixtures of medicines so common in his day, and still fondly adhered to by many of the "orthodox." Though they have given up Theriacum and its sixty-six ingredients,\* they still often prescribe a dozen or two different ingredients in a single pill or draught; on the principle that, as "accuracy of aim" is not

in their power, they try to make up for it by tying, as it were, a bundle of muskets together and firing them all off at once.

Now Hahnemann's object was accuracy of aim. His specific remedy goes straight to the heart of the disease, but leaves the man uninjured. The "orthodox" too often involve patient and disease in one common catastrophe.

The second subordinate reform which Hahnemann introduced was the small dose. He justly observes; that the proper dose of a medicine is that which is sufficiently powerful to cure the disease without injuring the patient.

This surely commends itself to good sense. The size of the dose itself has been determined by experimental observation.

Thirdly. Hahnemann discovered that substances were capable of infinitesimal division to a far greater extent than had ever been imagined before, and that many substances which were inert, in mass, become powerfully medicinal when their particles were finely divided. This also has been proved by careful experimental observation.\*

\* The development of medicinal power, by the division of massive substances into minute atoms, is in reality little else than the giving them solubility and fluidity. The recognition of this power has been, and still is, refused by many physicians, who, if they were properly conversant with the recognised facts of their own school, would no longer be able to withhold their belief in the power developed by trituration and molecular division.

The most easy example is that of *Mercury*—a substance so little medicinal in mass, that a pound weight might be taken with impunity. But when finely divided by rubbing it down with chalk (or any inert substance) it becomes so powerful, that a few grains act as an irritant poison. While, when made still more fluid, as it is in the preparation called Corrosive sublimate, a small portion of a grain becomes highly poisonous.

If mechanical division, by increasing the solubility of the Mercury,

These are, in a few words, the new truths discovered by Hahnemann. The reform which they have already introduced into the medical world is immense, the opposition they have met with has been acrimonious, but not more so than our previous knowledge of the reception of new truths would have led us to expect,—not more than is commensurate with the importance of the new truth itself.

Much has been said, by the opponents of Homœopathy, of the absurdity of the small doses, and a vast amount of very infinitesimal wit has been levelled against Homœopathy, for its use of them. It would appear more absurd to use the large dose than the small, if men would rightly consider the question.

increases its power many thousandfold, as has been acknowledged by all medical authorities, why should men withhold their belief from the possibility of still further development of power by still further division? Thus chalk, coffee, and many other substances, harmless in the mass, become medicinal by trituration and minute molecular division. (There is an excellent little work on the 'Infinitesimal Dose,' by Dr. Ryan, published by Turner and Co., 77, Fleet Street.) Some of our opponents, seeing the undoubted power of our medicines, and not having the honesty to experiment for themselves, accuse Homeopathic practitioners of dishonestly using concentrated medicines under the name of infinitesimals. We have no wish to claim that all men who practise as Homeopaths are honest. Every profession has its black sheep, but we deny the truth of the assertion that the effects of Homeopathie medicines is due to their being concentrated drugs. The dishonesty lies on the side of those men who endeavour to hide their own utter ignorance of infinitesimals, by making slanderous and unfounded imputations. It is open to these men to obtain Homeopathic medicines and have them analysed.

A physician, practising Homeopathy, is as much at liberty to use strong medicines as he is to use infinitesimals, provided he gives them in accordance with the Homeopathic law; but he would soon find that he would be driven to the adoption of very small, if not infinitesimal doses as his experience increased; and if he fairly carried on his experimental observations, he would be compelled to allow that even extreme infinitesimals exert a very marked power in curing disease, when applied skilfully.

Medicine is not food, and if experiment proves that the 100th or the 1000th part of a grain is sufficient to cure a man, would it not be much more absurd to give him 1 grain or 10 grains? Should we think him a wise man who insisted on paying £1000 for a railway ticket when the proper fare was £1? Yet the two cases are perfectly analogous, with the exception that one man is only injuring his pocket while the other is ruining his health. A witty writer truly observes, "If the allopathists were accustomed to give Calomel porridges, their wrath against small doses would be consistent; but when they are themselves reduced to grains, why should they cavil at the healers, who, by experiment, have found out the value of grains of grains?"\*

The fineness of the aim of Homeopathy compensates for the small size of the projectile. Suppose, like another William Tell, the physician had to shoot the apple of disease from the patient's head—would he do more wisely to choose a rifle or a monster cannon as his weapon? With the rifle he might pierce the apple and leave the patient untouched; but with the cannon ball, if he even hit the apple, he would certainly stun, if he did not kill the patient. Again the absurdity appears to lie in the large dose. Now the very essence of Homeopathic practice is, that it is specific to the disease, and that a very small dose of a well-chosen specific will suffice to cure, and has the double advantage of leaving all that part of the body which was untouched by the disease equally untouched by the medicine. The large dose would injure the patient, as well as attack the disease.

A very amusing anecdote went the round of the papers lately; it was this: An American allopathic physician was

called to see a case of small-pox; being a young man he had never seen a case of the kind before, and said to the father, "Wall, now, your boy has the small-pox; I aint well posted up in pustules, and don't know the *direct* way to treat it, so I must put him on the circular method. I'll give him some medicine that'll send him into fits, and I'm a stunner at fits."

Now that is a good illustration of allopathic practice. A man has a headache, the allopath isn't posted up in headaches, so he'll give him an artificial diarrhœa (by dosing him with blue pills and black draught), and then he can afterwards cure the diarrhœa. A method that is circular in more ways than one, for the purge weakens, and the weakness needs a tonic,—and then the tonic binds the bowels, and we come round again to the blue pill and black draught. The serpent, the emblem of allopathic physic, ought always to be represented biting its own tail. Always let us remember, that Allopathy means the circular method, and Homœopathy the direct method of attacking disease.

The success of Homoeopathy is as certain as that truth will triumph over error. Already Hahnemann's medical disciples are to be counted by thousands, scattered all over the habitable globe, while even the President of the British Medical Association\* is compelled to admit that among our patients are "prudent statesmen, astute lawyers, faithful ministers, discreet housewives," and, he might have added, a large proportion of royal and noble personages, men of letters and philosophers. The Queen of Spain has recently created Dr. Nunez (her Court physician) a marquis, and he is a Homoeopath.

We were present at a recent public occasion when Dr. Rae (the Arctic explorer) stated that he had found the Homeopathic

system of admirable efficacy in the inclement climate of the Arctic Circle.

From tropical India, a like testimony is borne to its wonderful power in curing cholera and other diseases, frightfully fatal under the care of the "orthodox" followers of Galen and Hippocrates.

From the Carribean Seas and the unhealthy regions round the Mexican Gulf come the praises of its beneficent power in arresting yellow fever, the scourge of these western lands. Wherever Homœopathy has been fairly tested, by men honest enough to give the requisite time and patience to acquaint themselves with its practice before essaying to put it to the trial, it has been adopted by the experimenter as one of the greatest boons conferred on suffering humanity. We do not claim to make man's body immortal; we do not claim to overcome every disease—to do so would be to arrogate the attributes of the Deity; but we do claim for Homœopathy that it cures such diseases as are curable, "safely, speedily, and pleasantly," thereby fulfilling the indication of Asclepiades, and insomuch effecting a most important reform in the Medical Art.

The Meetings of this Society are held in its rooms at the London Homocopathic Hospital, Great Ormond Street, Bloomsbury, on the first Thursday of every month during the Session, for the reading and discussion of papers and communications by members. There is an annual assembly in the month of April, May, or June of each year. Extraordinary Meetings may be convoked at any time by an order of the President and Council.

The Society has for its objects the advancement and extension of the principles of Homosopathy. It is divided into Fellows, and Ordinary, Honorary, Corresponding, and Inceptive Members. The officers of the Society consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Council, and an Honorary Secretary, all of whom are elected annually and are re-eligible. They must all (with the exception of the Honorary Secretary, on whom it is not imperative) be Fellows. Ordinary Members must be medical men residing in the United Kingdom, and members of some recognised University, College of Surgeons, or Licensing Body, whose knowledge

of Homœopathy, and experience of its principles and practice, enable them to treat their patients homœopathically. Every person desirous of becoming a candidate for election must be proposed by two members, and the name of the candidate be suspended in the Society's Hall during two meetings. All elections are conducted by ballot.

The transactions of the Society are published quarterly in a journal entitled 'Annals of the London Homosopathic Hospital and British Homosopathic Society.'

# AN ACT

TO

## REGULATE THE QUALIFICATIONS OF PRACTITION-ERS IN MEDICINE AND SURGERY.

2nd August, 1858.

WHEREAS it is expedient that Persons requiring Medical Aid should be enabled to distinguish qualified from unqualified Practitioners: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

- I. This Act may for all Purposes be cited as "The Short Title. Medical Act."
- II. This Act shall commence and take effect from the Commence-First Day of October One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.
- III. A Council which shall be styled "The General Medical Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom," herein-after referred to as the General Council, shall be established, and Branch Councils for

England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively formed thereout as herein-after mentioned.

Members of Council. IV. The General Council shall consist of One Person chosen from Time to Time by each of the following Bodies; (that is to say,)

The Royal College of Physicians:

The Royal College of Surgeons of England:

The Apothecaries' Society of London:

The University of Oxford:

The University of Cambridge:

The University of Durham:

The University of London:

The College of Physicians of Edinburgh:

The College of Surgeons of Edinburgh:

The Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons of Glasgow:

One Person chosen from Time to Time by the University of *Edinburgh* and the Two Universities of *Aberdeen* collectively:

One Person chosen from Time to Time by the University of Glasgow and the University of Saint Andrew's collectively:

One Person chosen from Time to Time by each of the following Bodies:

The King and Queen's College of Physicians in *Ireland*:

The Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland:

The Apothecaries' Hall of Ireland:

The University of Dublin:

The Queen's University in Ireland:

And Six Persons to be nominated by Her Majesty with the Advice of Her Privy Council, Four of whom shall be appointed for England, One for Scotland, and One for Ireland: and of a President, to be elected by the General Council.

V. If the said Universities of Edinburgh and Aberdeen, Provision in Glasgow and Saint Andrew's respectively, shall not be Universities able to agree upon some One Person to represent them Aberdeen, in the Council, it shall be lawful for each One of the drew's fail to said Universities to select One Person; and thereupon Person to reit shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the Advice of present them. Her Privy Council, to appoint One of the Persons so selected to be a Member of the said Council for the said Universities.

VI. The Members chosen by the Medical Corporations Branches of and Universities of England, Scotland, and Ireland, re- for England, spectively, and the Members nominated by Her Majesty, Ireland. with the Advice of Her Privy Council, for such Parts respectively of the United Kingdom, shall be the Branch Councils for such Parts respectively of the United Kingdom, to which Branch Councils shall be delegated such of the Powers and Duties vested in the Council as the Council may see fit other than the Power to make Representations to Her Majesty in Council as hereinafter mentioned: The President shall be a Member of all the Branch Councils.

VII. Members of the General Council representing Qualification. the Medical Corporations must be qualified to be registered under this Act.

VIII. The Members of the General Council shall be Resignation or Death of chosen and nominated for a Term not exceeding Five Member of General Years, and shall be capable of Re-appointment, and any Council

Member may at any Time resign his Appointment by Letter addressed to the President of the said Council, and upon the Death or Resignation of any Member of the said Council some other Person shall be constituted a Member of the said Council in his Place in manner herein-before provided; but it shall be lawful for the Council during such Vacancy to exercise the Powers herein-after mentioned.

Time and Place of Meeting of the General Council.

IX. The General Council shall hold their First Meeting within Three Months from the Commencement of this Act, in such Place and at such Time as One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State shall appoint, and shall make such Rules and Regulations as to the Times and Places of the Meetings of the General Council, and the Mode of summoning the same, as to them shall seem expedient, which Rules and Regulations shall remain in force until altered at any subsequent Meeting; and in the Absence of any Rule or Regulation as to the summoning a Meeting of the General Council, it shall be lawful for the President to summon a Meeting at such Time and Place as to him shall seem expedient by Letter addressed to each Member; and at every Meeting. in the Absence of the President, some other Member to be chosen from the Members present shall act as President: and all Acts of the General Council shall be decided by the Votes of the Majority of the Members present at any Meeting, the whole number present not being less than Eight, and at all such Meetings the President for the Time being shall, in addition to his Vote as a Member of the Council, have a Casting Vote, in case of an Equality of Votes; and the General Council shall have Power to appoint an Executive Committee out of their own Body, of which the Quorum shall

not be less than Three, and to delegate to such Committee such of the Powers and Duties vested in the Council as the Council may see fit, other than the Power of making Representations to Her Majesty in Council as hereinafter mentioned.

X. The General Council shall appoint a Registrar, Appointment who shall act as Secretary of the General Council, and and other who may also act as Treasurer, unless the Council shall Officers. appoint another Person or Persons as Treasurer or Treasurers; and the Person or Persons so appointed shall likewise act as Registrar for England, and as Secretary and Treasurer or Treasurers, as the Case may be, for the Branch Council for England; the General Council and Branch Council for England shall also appoint so many, Clerks and Servants as shall be necessary for the Purposes of this Act; and every Person so appointed by any Council shall be removable at the Pleasure of that Council, and shall be paid such Salary as the Council by which he was appointed shall think fit.

XI. The Branch Councils for Scatland and Ireland Appointment shall each respectively in like Manner appoint a Registrar and other and other Officers and Clerks who shall be paid such Branch Branch Salaries as such Branch Councils respectively shall think Councils. fit, and be removable at the Pleasure of the Council by which they were appointed; and the Person appointed Registrar shall also act as Secretary to the Branch Council, and may also act as Treasurer, unless the Council shall appoint some other Person or Persons as Treasurer or Treasurers.

XII. There shall be paid to the Members of the Fees for Councils such Fees for Attendance and such reasonable at Councils. Travelling Expenses as shall from Time to Time be allowed by the General Council and approved by the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury.

Expenses of the Councils.

XIII. All Monies payable to the respective Councils shall be paid to the Treasurers of such Councils respectively, and shall be applied to defray the Expenses of carrying this Act into execution in manner following; that is to say, separate Accounts shall be kept of the Expenses of the General Council, and of those of the Branch Councils; and the Expenses of the General Council, including those of keeping, printing, and publishing the Register for the United Kingdom, shall be defrayed, under the Direction of the General Council, by means of an equal Per-centage Rate upon all Monies received by the several Branch Councils; Returns shall be made by the Treasurers of the respective Branch Councils, at such Times as the General Council shall direct, of all Monies received by them; and the necessary Per-centage having been computed by the General Council, the respective Contributions shall be paid by the Tressurers of such Branch Councils to the Tressurer or Treasurers of the General Council; and the Expenses of the Branch Councils shall be defrayed, under the Direction of those Councils respectively, out of the Residue of the Monies so received as aforesaid.

Duty of Registrar to keep the Register correct. XIV. It shall be the Duty of the Registrars to keep their respective Registers correct in accordance with the Provisions of this Act, and the Orders and Regulations of the General Council, and to erase the Names of all registered Persons who shall have died, and shall from Time to Time make the necessary Alterations in the Addresses or Qualifications of the Persons registered under

this Act; and to enable the respective Registrars duly to fulfil the Duties imposed upon them it shall be lawful for the Registrar to write a Letter to any registered Person, addressed to him according to his Address on the Register, to inquire whether he has ceased to practise, or has changed his Residence, and if no Answer shall be returned to such Letter within the Period of Six Months from the sending of the Letter it shall be lawful to erase the Name of such Person from the Register; provided always, that the same may be restored by Direction of the General Council should they think fit to make an an Order to that Effect.

XV. Every Person now possessed, and (subject to the Registration Provisions hereinafter contained) every Person hereafter now qualified, becoming possessed, of any One or more of the Qualific Persons cations described in the Schedule (A.) to this Act, shall, becoming on Payment of a Fee, not exceeding Two Pounds. in qualified. respect of Qualifications obtained before the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and not exceeding Five Pounds in respect of Qualifications obtained on or after that day, be entitled to be registered on producing to the Registrar of the Branch Council for England, Scotland, or Ireland the Document conferring or evidencing the Qualification or each of the Qualifications in respect whereof he seeks to be so registered, or upon transmitting by Post to such Registrar Information of his Name and Address, and Evidence of the Qualification or Qualifications in respect whereof he seeks to be registered, and of the Time or Times at which the same was or were respectively obtained: Provided always, that it shall be lawful for the several Colleges and other Bodies mentioned in the said Schedule (A.) to transmit from Time to Time to the said Registrar

Lists certified under their respective Seals of the several Persons who, in respect of Qualifications granted by such Colleges and Bodies respectively, are for the Time being entitled to be registered under this Act, stating the respective Qualifications and Places of Residence of such Persons: and it shall be lawful for the Registrar thereupon, and upon the Payment of such Fee as aforesaid in respect of each Person to be registered, to enter in the Register the Persons mentioned in such Lists. with their Qualifications and Places of Residence as therein dated, without other Application in relation thereto.

Council to make Orders Registers to be kept.

XVI. The General Council shall, with all convenient for regulating Speed after the passing of this Act, and from Time to Time as Occasion may require, make Orders for regulating the Registers to be kept under this Act as nearly as conveniently may be in accordance with the Form set forth in Schedule (D.) to this Act, or to the like Effect.

Persons practising in England before 1st August, 1815, entitled to be registered.

XVII. Any Person who was actually practising Medicine in England before the First Day of August One thousand eight hundred and fifteen shall, on Payment of a Fee to be fixed by the General Council, be entitled to be registered on producing to the Registrar of the Branch Council for England, Scotland, or Iroland a Declaration according to the Form in the Schedule (B.) to this Act signed by him, or upon transmitting to such Registrar Information of his Name and Address, and enclosing such Declaration as aforesaid.

XVIII. XX. XXI. It shall be lawful for the Privy Council, upon Privy Council any such Representation as aforesaid, if it see fit, to order the Right of that any Qualification granted by such College or Body, in respect of

after such Time as may be mentioned in the Order, shall not confer any Right to be registered under this Act: Provided always, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the Advice of Her Privy Council, when it is made to appear to Her, upon further Representation from the General Council or otherwise, that such College or Body has made effectual Provision, to the Satisfaction of such General Council, for the Improvement of such Course of Study or Examination, or the Mode of conducting such Examinations, to revoke any such Order.

Persons not to be registered in respect of Qualifications granted by the College

XXII. After the Time mentioned in this Behalf in any such Order in Council, no Person shall be entitled to be registered under this Act in respect of any such Qualification as in such Order mentioned, granted by the or Body to which such Order relates, after the Time therein mentioned, and the Revocation of any such Order shall not entitle any Person to be registered in respect of any Qualification granted before such Revocation.

Privy Council may prohibit Attempts to impose Restrictions as to any Theory of Medicine or Surgery by Bodies entitled to grant Certificates.

XXIII. In case it shall appear to the General Council that an Attempt has been made by any Body, entitled under this Act to grant Qualifications, to impose upon any Candidate offering himself for Examination an Obligation to adopt or refrain from adopting the Practice of any particular Theory of Medicine or Surgery, as a Test or Condition of admitting him to Examination or of granting a Certificate, it shall be lawful for the said Council to represent the same to Her Majesty's most Honorable Privy Council, and the said Privy Council may thereupon issue an Injunction to such Body so acting, directing them to desist from such Practice; and in the event of their not complying therewith, then to order that such Body shall cease to have the Power of conferring any Right to be registered under this Act so long as they shall continue such Practice.

XXIV. All Powers vested in the Privy Council by this As to the making and Act may be exercised by any Three or more of the Lords Authenticaand others of the Privy Council, the Vice-President of tion of orders, &c. the Committee of the said Privy Council on Education being One of them; and all Orders and Acts of the Privy Council under this Act shall'be sufficiently made and signified by a written or printed Document, signed by one of the Clerks of the Privy Council, or such Officer as may be appointed by the Privy Council in this Behalf; and all Orders and Acts made or signified by any written or printed Document purporting to be so signed shall be deemed to have been duly made, issued, and done by the Privy Council; and every such Document shall be received in Evidence in all Courts, and before all Justices and others, without Proof of the Authority or Signature of such Clerk or other Officer or other Proof whatsoever, until it be shown that such Document was not duly signed by the Authority of the Privy Council.

XXV. Where any Person entitled to be registered As to Regisunder this Act applies to the Registrar of any of the said Branch Branch Councils for that Purpose, such Registrar shall forthwith enter in a Local Register in the Form set forth in Schedule (D.) to this Act, or to the like Effect, to be kept by him for that Purpose, the Name and Place of Residence, and the Qualification or several Qualifications in respect of which the Person is so entitled, and the Date of the Registration, and shall, in the Case of the Registrar of the Branch Council for Scotland or Ireland. with all convenient Speed send to the Registrar of the General Council a Copy, certified under the Hand of the

Registrar, of the Entry so made, and the Registrar of the General Council shall forthwith cause the same to be entered in the General Register; and such Registrar shall also forthwith cause all Entries made in the Local Register for *England* to be entered in the General Register; and the Entry on the General Register shall bear Date from the Local Register.

Evidence of Qualification to be given before Registration.

XXVI. No Qualification shall be entered on the Register, either on the First Registration or by way of Addition to a registered Name unless the Registrar be satisfied by the proper Evidence that the Person claiming is entitled to it; and any Appeal from the Decision of the Registrar may be decided by the General Council, or by the Council for England, Scotland, or Ireland (as the Case may be); and any Entry which shall be proved to the Satisfaction of such General Council or Branch Council to have been fradulently or incorrectly made may be erased from the Register by Order in Writing of such General Council or Branch Council.

Register to be published.

XXVII. The Registrar of the General Council shall in every Year cause to be printed, published, and sold, under the Direction of such Council, a correct Register of the Names in alphabetical Order according to the Surnames, with the respective Residences, in the Form set forth in Schedule (D.) to this Act, or to the like Effect, and Medical Titles, Diplomas, and Qualifications conferred by any Corporation or University, or by Doctorate of the Archbishop of Canterbury, with the Dates thereof, of all Persons appearing on the General Register as existing on the First Day of January in every Year; and such Register shall be called "The Medical Register;" and a Copy of the Medical Register

for the Time being, purporting to be so printed and published as aforesaid, shall be Evidence in all Courts and before all Justices of the Peace and others that the Persons therein specified are registered according to the Provisions of this Act: and the Absence of the Name of any Person from such Copy shall be evidence, until the contrary be made to appear, that such Person is not registered according to the Provisions of this Act: Provided always, that in the Case of any Person whose Name does not appear in such Copy, a certified Copy, under the Hand of the Registrar of the General Council or of any Branch Council, of the Entry of the Name of such Person on the General or Local Register shall be Evidence that such Person is registered under the Provisions of this Act.

XXVIII. If any of the said Colleges or the said Names of Members Bodies at any Time exercise any Power they possess by struck off from List of College or Body College, &c., the Name of any One of their Members, such College or to General Body shall signify to the General Council the Name of Council. the Member so struck off; and the General Council may, if they see fit, direct the Registrar to erase forthwith from the Register the Qualification derived from such College or Body in respect of which such Member was registered, and the Registrar shall note the same therein: Provided always, that the Name of no Person shall be erased from the Register on the Ground of his having adopted any Theory of Medicine or Surgery.

XXIX. If any registered Medical Practitioner shall Medical be convicted in England or Ireland of any Felony or convicted of Misdemeanor, or in Scotland of any Crime or Offence, or Felony may shall after due Inquiry be judged by the General Council the Register.

to have been guilty of infamous Conduct in any professional respect, the General Council may, if they see fit, direct the Registrar to erase the Name of such Medical Practitioner from the Register.

Registered Persons may have subsequent Qualifications inserted in the Register. XXX. Every Person registered under this Act who may have obtained any higher Degree or any Qualification other than the Qualification in respect of which he may have been registered, shall be entitled to have such higher Degree or additional Qualification inserted in the Register in substitution for or in addition to the Qualification previously registered, on Payment of such Fee as the Council may appoint.

Privileges of registered Persons. XXXI. Every Person registered under this Act shall be entitled according to his Qualification or Qualifications to practise Medicine or Surgery, or Medicine and Surgery, as the case may be, in any Part of Her Majesty's Dominions, and to demand and recover in any Court of Law, with full Costs of Suit, reasonable Charges for professional Aid, Advice, and Visits, and the Cost of any Medicines or other Medical or Surgical Appliances rendered or supplied by him to his Patients: Provided always, that it shall be lawful for any College of Physicians to pass a Byelaw to the effect that no one of their Fellows or Members shall be entitled to sue in manner aforesaid in any Court of Law, and thereupon such Byelaw may be pleaded in Bar to any Action for the Purposes aforesaid commenced by any Fellow or Member of such College.

None but registered Persons to recover Charges. XXXII. After the First Day of [January] July One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, no Person shall be entitled to recover any Charge in any Court of Law for any Medical or Surgical Advice, Attendance, or for the

Performance of any Operation, or for any Medicine which he shall have both prescribed and supplied, unless he shall prove upon the Trial that he is registered under this Act.

XXXIII. Provided also, That no Person who on the Poor Law First of October One thousand eight hundred and fifty- Officers not eight shall be acting as Medical Officer under an Order if registered of the Poor Law Commissioners or Poor Law Board shall Months of be disqualified to hold such Office by reason of his not het. being registered as herein required, unless he shall have failed to be registered within Six Months from the passing of this Act.]

XXXIV. After the First Day of [January] July One Meaning of thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, the Words "legally "legally qualified Medical Practitioner" or "duly quali- Medical Pracfied Medical Practitioner," or any Words importing a titioner," &c. Person recognised by Law as a Medical Practitioner or Member of the Medical Profession, when used in any Act of Parliament, shall be construed to mean a Person registered under this Act.

XXXV. Every Person who shall be registered under Registered Persons exthe Provisions of this Act shall be exempt, if he shall so empted from desire, from serving on all Juries and Inquests whatso-Juries, &c. ever, and from serving all corporate, parochial, Ward, Hundred, and Township Offices, and from serving in the Militia, and the Name of such Person shall not be returned in any List of Persons liable to serve in the Militia, or in any such Office as aforesaid.

XXXVI. After the First Day of [January] July One Unregistered thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, no Person shall to hold hold any Appointment as a Physician, Surgeon or other pointments.

Medical Officer either in the Military or Naval Service, or in Emigrant or other Vessels, or in any Hospital, Infirmary, Dispensary, or Lying-in Hospital, not supported wholly by Voluntary Contributions, or in any Lunatic Asylum, Gaol, Penitentiary, House of Correction, House of Industry, Parochial or Union Workhouse or Poorhouse, Parish Union, or other Public Establishment, Body, or Institution, or to any Friendly or other Society for affording mutual Relief in Sickness, Infirmity, or old Age, or as a Medical Officer of Health, unless he be registered under this Act: Provided always, that nothing in this Act contained shall extend to repeal or alter any of the Provisions of the Passengers' Act, 1865.

No Certificate to be valid signing be registered.

XXXVII. After the First Day of [January] July unless Person One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, no Certificate required by any Act now in force, or that may hereafter be passed from any Physician, Surgeon, Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery, or other Medical Practitioner, shall be valid unless the Person signing the same shall be registered under this Act.

Penalty on wilful Falsification of Register.

XXXVIII. Any Registrar who shall wilfully make or cause to be made any Falsification in any Matters relating to the Register shall be deemed guilty of a Misdemeanor in England or Ireland, and in Scotland of a Crime or Offence punishable by Fine or Imprisonment, and shall, on Conviction thereof, be imprisoned for any Term not exceeding Twelve Months.

Penalty for obtaining Registration by false Representations.

XXXIX. If any Person shall wilfully procure or attempt to procure himself to be registered under this Act, by making or producing or causing to be made or produced any false or fraudulent Representation or Declaration, either verbally or in Writing, every such Person so offending, and every Person aiding and assisting him therein, shall be deemed guilty of a Misdemeanor in England and Ireland, and in Scotland of a Crime or Offence punishable by Fine or Imprisonment, and shall, on Conviction thereof, be sentenced to be imprisoned for any Term not exceeding Twelve Months.

XL. Any Person who shall wilfully and falsely pre-Penalty for tend to be or take or use the Name or Title of a Physician, tending to be Doctor of Medicine, Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery, Person. Bachelor of Medicine, Surgeon, General Practitioner or Apothecary, or any Name, Title, Addition, or Description implying that he is registered under this Act, or that he is recognised by Law as a Physician, or Surgeon, or Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery, or a Practitioner in Medicine, or an Apothecary, shall, upon a summary Conviction for any such Offence, pay a Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds.

XLI. Any Penalty to which under this Act any Recovery of Person is liable on summary Conviction of any Offence may be recovered as follows; (that is to say,) in England, in manner directed by the Act of the Session holden in the Eleventh and Twelfth Years of Her Majesty, Chapter Forty-three, and in Ireland in manner directed by "The Petty Sessions (Ireland) Act, 1851," or any other Act for the Time being in force in England and Ireland respectively for the like Purposes; and any such Penalty may in Scotland be recovered by the Procurator Fiscal of the County, or by any other Person before the Sheriff or Two Justices, who may proceed in a summary Way and grant Warrant for bringing the Party complained against before him or them, or issue an Order requiring

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such Party to appear on a Day and at a Time and Place to be named in such Order, and every such Order shall be served on the Party by delivering to him in Person or by leaving at his usual Place of Abode a Copy of such Order and of the Complaint whereupon the same has proceeded, and upon the Appearance or Default to appear of the Party, it shall be lawful for the Sheriff or Justices to proceed to the hearing of the Complaint, and upon Proof on Oath or Confession of the Offence, the Sheriff or Justices shall without any written Pleadings or Record of Evidence commit the Offender and decern him to pay the Penalty named as well as such Expenses as . the Sheriff or Justices shall think fit, and failing Payment shall grant Warrant for Recovery thereof by Poinding and Imprisonment, such Imprisonment to be for such Period as the Discretion of the Sheriff or Justices may direct, not exceeding Three Calendar Months, and to cease on Payment of the Penalty and Expenses.

Application of Penalties.

XLII. Any Sum or Sums of Money arising from Conviction and Recovery of Penalties as aforesaid shall be paid to the Treasurer of the General Council.

Application of Monies received by Treasurer. XLIII. All Monies received by any Treasurer arising from Fees to be paid on Registration, from the Sale of Registers, from Penalties, or otherwise, shall be applied for Expenses of Registration and of the Execution of this Act.

Accounts to be published.

XLIV. The Treasurers of the General and Branch Councils shall enter in Books to be kept for that Purpose a true Account of all Sums of Money by them received and paid, and such Accounts shall be submitted by them to the respective General Council and Branch Councils at such Times as the Councils shall require; and the

said Accounts shall be published Annually, and such Accounts shall be laid before both Houses in the Month of March in every Year, if Parliament be sitting, or, if Parliament be not sitting, then within One Month after the next Meeting of Parliament.

XLV. Every Registrar of Deaths in the United King- Notice of dom on receiving Notice of the Death of any Medical Medical Prac Practitioner shall forthwith transmit by Post to the Re- be given by gistrar of the General Council and to the Registrar of the Branch Council a Certificate under his own Hand of such Death, with the Particulars of Time and Place of Death, and may charge the Cost of such Certificate and Transmission as an Expense of his Office, and on the Receipt of such Certificate the Medical Registrar shall erase the Name of such deceased Medical Practitioner from the Register.

XLVI. It shall be lawful for the General Council by Provision for Special Orders to dispense with such Provisions of this tising in the Colonies and Act or with such Part of any Regulations made by its elsewhere, and for Authority as to them shall see fit, in favour of Persons Students. now practising Medicine or Surgery in any Part of Her Majesty's Dominions other than Great Britain and Ireland by virtue of any of the Qualifications described in Schedule (A.); and also in favour of Persons practising Medicine or Surgery in the United Kingdom on foreign or colonial Diplomas or Degrees before the passing of this Act; and also in favour of any Persons who have held appointments as Surgeons or Assistant Surgeons in the Army, Navy, or Militia, or in the Service of the East India Company, or are acting as Surgeons in the public Service, or in the Service of any Charitable Institutions, and also, so far as to the Council shall seem expedient,

in favour of Medical Students who shall have commenced their professional Studies before the passing of this Act.

New Charter may be granted to the College of Physicians of Loudon.

XLVII. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty to grant to the Corporation of the Royal College of Physicians of London a new Charter, and thereby to give to such Corporation the Name of "The Royal College of Physicians of England," and to make such Alterations in the Constitution of the same Corporation as to Her Majesty may seem expedient; and it shall be lawful for the said Corporation to accept such Charter under their Common Seal, and such acceptance shall operate as a Surrender of all Charters heretofore granted to the said Corporation, except the Charter granted by King Henry the Eighth, and shall also operate as a surrender of such Charter, and of any Rights, Powers, or Privileges conferred by or enjoyed under an Act of the Session holden in the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Years of King Henry the Eighth, Chapter Five, confirming the same, as far as such Charter and Act respectively may be inconsistent with such new Charter: Provided nevertheless, that within Twelve Months after the granting of such Charter to the College of Physicians of London, any Fellow, Member, or Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, or of the Queen's College of Physicians of Ireland, who may be in practice as a Physician in any Part of the United Kingdom called England, and who may be desirous of becoming a Member of such College of Physicians of England, shall be at liberty to do so, and be entitled to receive the Diploma of the said College, and to be admitted to all the Rights and Privileges thereunto appertaining, on the Payment of a Registration Fee of Two Pounds to the said College.

XLVIII. XLIX. If at any future Period the Royal College of Sur- The Faculty geons of Edinburgh and Faculty of Physicians and Sur- may be amalgeons of Glasgow agree to amalgamate, so as to form One gamated. united Corporation, under the Name of "The Royal College of Surgeons of Scotland," it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to grant, and for such College and Faculty under their respective Common Seals to accept, such new Charter or Charters as may be necessary for effecting such Union, and such Acceptance shall operate as a Surrender of all Charters heretofore granted to such College and Faculty; and in the event of such Union it shall be competent for the said College and Faculty to make such Arrangements as to the Time and Place of their Examinations as they may agree upon, these Arrangements being in conformity with the Provisions

of this Act, and subject to the Approval of the General Council.

New Charter may be granted to the King and Queen's College of Ireland.

LI. It shall be lawful for Her Majesty to grant to the Corporation of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland a new Charter, and thereby to give to Physicians in such Corporation the Name of "The Royal College of Physicians of Ireland," and to make such Alterations in the Constitution of the said Corporation as to Her Majesty may seem expedient; and it shall be lawful for the said Corporation to accept such Charter under their Common Seal, and such Acceptance shall operate as a Surrender of the Charter granted by King William and Queen Mary, so far as it may be inconsistent with such new Charter.

Charters not to contain new Restrictions in the Practice of Medicine or Surgery.

LII. Provided always, That nothing herein contained shall extend to authorise Her Majesty to create any new Restriction in the Practice of Medicine or Surgery, or to grant to any of the said Corporations any Powers or Privileges contrary to the Common Law of the Land or to the Provisions of this Act, and that no such new Charter shall in anywise prejudice, affect, or annul any of the existing Statutes or Byelaws of the Corporations to which the same shall be granted, further than shall be necessary for giving full Effect to the Alterations which shall be intended to be effected by such new Charters and by this Act in the Constitution of such Corporation.

Provisions of 17 & 18 Vict. c. 114, as to University of London to continue in force.

LIII. The Enactments and Provisions of the University of London Medical Graduates Act, 1854, shall be deemed and construed to have applied and shall apply to the University of London for the Time being, notwithstanding the Surrender or Determination of the thereinrecited Charter, and the granting or Acceptance of the now existing Charter of the University of *London*, or the future Determination of the present or any future Charter of the said University, and the granting of any new Charter to the said University; and that every Bachelor of Medicine and Doctor of Medicine of the University of *London* for the Time being shall be deemed to have been and to be entitled and shall be entitled to the Privileges conferred by the said Act, in the same Manner and to the same Extent as if the Charter recited in the said Act remained in force, subject nevertheless to the Provisions of this Act.

LIV. The General Council shall cause to be published British Pharmacopenia to under their Direction a Book containing a List of Medicines and Compounds, and the Manner of preparing them, together with the Weights and Measures by which they are to be prepared and mixed, and containing such other Matter and Things relating thereto as the General Council shall think fit, to be called "British Pharmacopeia;" and the General Council shall cause to be altered, amended, and republished such Pharmacopeia as often as they shall deem it necessary.

LV. Nothing in this Act contained shall extend or be chemists, account to be construed to extend to prejudice or in any way to affect affected. the lawful Occupation, Trade, or Business of Chemists and Druggists and Dentists, or the Rights, Privileges, or Employment of duly licensed Apothecaries in *Ireland*, so far as the same extend to selling, compounding, or dispensing Medicines.

An Act to amend the Medical Act (1858).

[19th April, 1859.]

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Par- 91 & 22 Vict. liament, Chapter Ninety, "The Medical Act," Provision is made for the Registration of Members of the Medical Profession, and certain Disabilities are imposed, after the First day of January One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, on Members of that Profession who are not then registered: And whereas, by reason of the Time required for the Collection and Examination of the proper Evidence on the first Formation of "The Medical Register," it is expedient to amend the said Act as hereinafter mentioned: And whereas it is expedient that Schedule D. of the aforesaid Act should be amended: And whereas in Sections Thirty-one and Forty-seven of the Medical Act (1858) the Terms "Fellow" and "Member" of the Royal Colleges of Physicians of London and Edinburgh are made use of, whilst in Schedule A. in the same Act "Fellows," "Licentiates," and "Extra Licentiates" of the said Colleges are alone entitled to be registered: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty,

by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

1st July, 1859, to be substituted in ss. 32, 34, 36, and 37, of recited Act, for 1st Jan., 1859.

I. The First Day of July One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine shall be substituted, in sections Thirty-two, Thirty-four, Thirty-six, and Thirty-seven respectively of the said Act, for the First Day of January One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine; and the said several Sections, and all Provisions of the said Act having reference thereto, shall be construed and take effect as if the Word July had been originally inserted in each of the said Sections instead of the Word January.

Act passed in the Twenty-second Year of the reign of Her Majesty, Chapter Twenty-one; and certain Disabilities are imposed by the said Acts, after a Period mentioned therein, on Members of that Profession who are not then registered: And whereas it is expedient that the said recited Acts should be amended as hereinafter mentioned: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

CAP LXVI.

An Act to amend the Medical Act (1858).

[6th August, 1860.]

WHEREAS by "The Medical Act, 1858," it is provided 21 & 22 Vict. that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to grant to the c. 90 Corporation of the Royal College of Physicians of London a new Charter, and thereby to give to such Corporation the Name of "The Royal College of Physicians of England," and to grant to the Corporation of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh a new Charter and thereby to give to the said College of Physicians the Name of "The Royal College of Physicians of Scotland," and to grant to the Corporation of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland a new Charter, and thereby to give to such Corporation the Name of "The Royal College of Physicians of Ireland;" but Provision is not made by the said Act for reserving to the said Colleges, and the Presidents and Censors, Fellows, Members, Licentiates, and Extra Licentiates thereof respectively, by their said new Names, the Powers, Privileges, Liberties, and Immunities to which

they are respectively entitled by their existing Names,

and Doubts have arisen whether, in case of the Acceptance by these Colleges respectively of new Charters under such altered Names respectively, the said Powers, Privileges, Liberties, and Immunities would legally attach and be preserved to them, and it is expedient that such Doubts should be removed: And whereas by an Act passed in the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Years of the 14 & 15 Hen. Reign of King Henry the Eighth, intituled The Privileges and Authorities of Physicians in London, certain Letters Patent, dated the Twenty-third day of September, in the Tenth Year of the Reign of His said Majesty, whereby certain Physicians in London therein named were incorporated by the Name of "The President and College or Commonalty of the Faculty of Physic in London," were ratified and confirmed; and by the said Act it was enacted, that the Six Persons named in the said Letters Patent, and Two more of the said Commonalty to be chosen by them, should be called Elects, and that the said Elects should yearly choose One of them to be President of the said Commonalty, and that as oft as any of the Places of the said Elects should become void the Survivors should choose and admit One or more, as Need should require, of the said Faculty to supply the Number of Eight Persons, and that no Person should from thenceforth be suffered to practise in Physic through England until he be examined by the said President and Three of the said Elects, and have from them Letters Testimonial, except he be a graduate of Oxford or Cambridge: And whereas the main Function of the said Elects, viz., that of examining and granting Letters Testimonial, has been virtually superseded by the said Medical Act, and they have ceased to grant Letters Testimonial in accordance with the Provisions contained

in the last-recited Act; and it is therefore expedient that the before-recited Provisions should be repealed: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

I. The Expression in the Medical Act and this Act Interpreta"The Corporation of the Royal College of Physicians of
London," or "The Royal College of Physicians of
London," shall be taken to denote the Corporation of
"The President and College or Commonalty of the
Faculty of Physic in London."

II. Any new Charter which, under the Provisions of New Charters the Medical Act, shall be granted to the Corporation of granted to the Colleges. the Royal College of Physicians of London, may be granted to them either by and in the Name of the Royal College of Physicians of London, or, as provided by that Act, by and in the Name of the Royal College of Physicians of England; and any such new Charter granted to the Corporation of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh may be granted to that College either by and in its present Name, or, as provided by the Medical Act, by and in the Name of the Royal College of Physicians of Scotland; and any such new Charter granted to the Corporation of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland may be granted to that College either by and in its present Name, or, as provided by the Medical Act, by and in the Name of the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland.

III. The granting of new Charters to the said Corpo- Colleges to rations respectively by and in the altered Names and existing

Rights, notwithstanding Change of Name.

Styles respectively, as provided in the Medical Act, shall not, in respect of such Alteration of Name or Style merely, alter or affect in any way the Rights, Powers, Authorities, Qualifications, Liberties, Exemptions, Immunities, Duties, and Obligations granted, conferred, or imposed to or upon, or continued and preserved to the said Corporations respectively, and the respective Presidents, Censors, Fellows, Members, and Licentiates thereof, by the respective Charters and Acts of Parlialiament relating to the said Corporations respectively, or by the Medical Act, the Act to amend the Medical Act, the Medical Acts Amendment Act, 1860, and this Act respectively; but the said Corporations respectively, and the respective Presidents, Censors, Fellows, Members, and Licentiates thereof, shall, notwithstanding any such Change of Name and Style, have and retain all such and the same Rights, Powers, Authorities, Qualifications, Liberties, Exemptions, and Immunities, and be subject to all such and the same Duties and Obligations, as if such new Charters respectively had been granted to them by and in their respective Names and Styles as then existing.

Colleges to hold Property, not-withstanding Change of Name.

IV. Each of the said Corporations shall also, notwithstanding any such Alteration of Name or Style, have, hold, and enjoy, all Lands and other Real and Personal, Heritable and Moveable Property belonging to such Corporation, either beneficially or in trust, at the Date of the granting of such new Charter, and may execute and perform any Use or Trust for the Time being vested or reposed in such Corporation.

Provisions in

V. So much of the Act of the Fourteen and Fifteen 14 & 15 Hen. Henry the Eighth, Chapter Five, as relates to the Elects of the said Royal College of Physicians of London, and the Elects their Powers and Functions, shall be and the same is hereby repealed, but this Repeal shall not prejudice or affect the Rights and Privileges of any Persons to whom the said President and Elects may have granted Letters Testimonial; and all Trusts which by any Deed, Gift, Devise, or Bequest are vested in, or to be executed or performed by the Elects, or some defined Number of them, shall vest in and accrue to, and be executed and performed by the Censors of the said College for the Time being as if the Name of the Censors had in such Instruments respectively been used instead of that of the Elects, and the Office and Name of the Elects of the said College shall henceforth wholly cease and determine.

VI. The Office of President of "The Boyal College of Election of Physicians of London" shall be an annual Office; and of the Royal Thomas Mayo, Doctor of Physic, the now President of Physicians of the said Corporation, shall remain such President until London. the Day next after Palm Sunday in the Year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, when he shall go out of Office; and the Fellows of the said Corporation shall, at a Meeting to be holden by them for that Purpose, on the same Day, and on the same Day in every subsequent Year, elect some One of the Fellows of the said Corporation in such Manner as shall be provided by any Byelaw or Byelaws made in that Behalf by the said Corporation, and for the Time being in force, to be President of the said Corporation, but the retiring President shall always be capable of being re-elected, and every President shall remain in Office until the actual Election of a new President; or in case of the Death, Resignation, or other Avoidance of any such President before the Expiration of his Year of Office, the said Fellows shall, at a

Meeting to be holden by them for that Purpose, as soon as conveniently may be (of which due Notice shall be given), elect One other of the Fellows of the said Corporation in such Manner as aforesaid to be President for the Remainder of the Year in which such Death, Resignation, or other Avoidance shall happen, and until such Election the Duties of President shall be performed by the senior Censor for the Time being.

# VICTORIÆ REGINÆ.

CAP. XCI.

An Act to incorporate the General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom, and for other purposes.

[7th August, 1862.]

Whereas by the Medical Act passed in the Session 21 & 22 Vict., holden in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Years of the Reign of Her present Majesty, Chapter Ninety, a Council is established, under the Style of "The General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom," and certain Duties and Obligations are imposed on such Council, and in particular it is provided, that the General Council shall cause to be published under their Direction a Book, containing a List of Medicines and Compounds, and the Manner of preparing them, together with the true Weights and Measures by which they are to be prepared and mixed, and containing such other Matter and Things relating thereto as the General Council shall think fit, to be called "British Pharmacopæia," and Power is given to the said

Council to alter, amend, and republish such Pharmacopœias as often as they shall deem it necessary: And whereas different Pharmacopæias have hitherto been in use in England, Scotland, and Ireland, published in England under the Direction of the Royal College of Physicians of London, and sanctioned by an Order of Her Majesty in Council, published in Scotland under the Direction of the Royal College of Physicians of Edinburgh, but without any legal Sanction, and published in Ireland under the Direction of the King and Queen's College of Physicians in Ireland, and sanctioned by Act of Parliament: And whereas the Pharmacopæia to be published by the said Council is intended to supersede the abovementioned Pharmacopæias: And whereas it is expedient to incorporate the said Council, and to make such Provisions as are hereinafter contained with respect to the said British Pharmacopæia: Be it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

Incorporation of Council. I. "The General Council of Medical Education and Registration of the United Kingdom" shall be deemed to be and to have been, from the Date of its first Establishment, a Body Corporate by the Name aforesaid, having a perpetual Succession and a Common Seal, with a Capacity to hold Lands for the Purposes of the said Medical Act.

Right of printing Pharmacopecia vested in Council.

II. The exclusive Right of publishing, printing, and selling the said Pharmacopæia shall vest in the said General Council, subject to this Proviso, that it shall be lawful for the Commissioners of the Treasury from Time

to Time to fix the Price at which Copies of the said Work are to be sold to the Public.

III. The British Pharmacopoeia, when published, Notice to be shall for all Purposes be deemed to be substituted gazettes when British throughout Great Britain and Ireland for the several Pharmashove mostional Plane above-mentioned Pharmacopœias, and any Act of Parlia-published. ment, Order in Council, or Custom relating to any of such last-mentioned Pharmacopæias shall be deemed, after the Publication of the British Pharmacopæia, to refer to such Pharmacopœia.

· Notice in the London, Edinburgh, and Dublin Gazettes to the Effect that the British Pharmacopœia has been published shall be deemed sufficient Evidence of its Publication for the Purposes of this Act, and a Copy of the said Pharmacopæia printed by such Person as may be named in the said Notice, or in any other Notice published in the said Gazettes, as authorized by the General Council to print the said Pharmacopæia, shall be admitted in Evidence as being the Pharmacopæia directed to be published by the above-mentioned Act.

### EXTRACTS FROM THE LAWS OF THE HOSPITAL.

#### GOVERNMENT AND MANAGEMENT.

The direction of the affairs of the Hospital is entrusted to the Board of Management, composed of twenty-one Governors, or Subscribers of One Guinea and upwards.

### QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS, ETC.

Benefactors consist of Annual Subscribers of Ten Guineas, and upwards, and of Donors of Fifty Guineas and upwards, who, in addition to the privileges hereinafter mentioned, are eligible, by virtue of their contributions, to be elected Vice-Presidents of the Hospital.

Every Subscriber of Three Guineas or upwards is an Annual Governor; and every individual making a donation of Thirty Guineas or upwards is a Life Governor.

Every firm or company, paying the Subscription or Donation required to constitute an Annual or a Life Governor, may appoint a member of the firm or company, who shall stand in the position of an individual Governor.

It shall be lawful for the Board of Management to appoint any person a Life Governor in consideration of services rendered to the Hospital or to appoint as a Life Governor, the Executor of any benefactor by will.

Contributors are entitled to privileges according to the following scale, and subject to the Laws for the admission of Patients:—

1. An Annual Subscription of Ten Guineas, or a Donation of Fifty Guineas, entitles the Subscriber or Donor to have one in-patient always in the Hospital, and ten out-patients every month, and to have ten votes; and so on for every further Annual Subscription of Ten Guineas, or Donation of Fifty Guineas.

- 2. An Annual Subscription of Three Guineas, or a Donation of Thirty Guineas, entitles the Subscriber or Donor to have three in-patients every year, and three out-patients every month, and to have three votes; and so on in the same proportion.
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The right of election of the several officers of the Hospital Medical Staff is vested in the Governors and Subscribers.

All votes are to be taken by ballot, under the direction of the Board, if a poll is demanded. Ladies, Peers, Members of Parliament, as also Governors and Subscribers, prevented by certified illness from attending the Meeting, or residing, or being at the time of the Meeting, more than ten miles from the Hospital, shall be entitled to vote by proxy; such proxies being delivered by a Governor or Subscriber at the time of voting, under the signatures of the parties granting them.

No person shall be entitled to vote at any Election or General Meeting, who has not been a Subscriber at least three months previously to such Election or General Meeting.

### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

All necessitous persons presenting letters filled up and signed by a Governor or Subscriber entitled to give a letter of recommendation, are admissible as in-patients, and shall be admitted every Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock, if, after due examination by the Medical Board, they shall be re-

ported as proper objects to be received into the Hospital, and the House Committee shall think fit to admit them.

In the case of persons living at a distance, or unable to undergo the fatigue of personal attendance at the Hospital, for the purpose of being examined, a Medical Certificate must be sent, with the letter of recommendation from a Governor or Subscriber, addressed to the Honorary Secretary, in time to be laid before the House Committee and Medical Officers at their Weekly Meeting, for such directions as they may think fit to give for their admission or otherwise.

All poor persons, with or without a letter of recommendation from a Governor or Subscriber, applying at the Hospital on any other day, and at any other hour than the above, for relief from accidents or diseases of extreme urgency, shall be admissible as in-patients, provided there are vacant beds, on a certificate signed after due examination, by the Resident Medical Officer.

When there shall be no room for all persons recommended at one time by the Medical Board, those only shall be admitted whose cases shall appear to be the most urgent and suitable; and the other applicants, if considered to be proper objects, may be postponed and prescribed for as out-patients until they can be taken into the Hospital.

No person who is capable of paying for medical attendance, and no person being in a state of confirmed consumption, or having, or suspected to have, the smallpox, or itch, shall be admissible; and no person shall be admitted, or permitted to remain as an in-patient, who is capable of receiving equal benefit as an out-patient, or is merely requiring such rest and attention as a workhouse can supply.

Previously to the admission of any in-patient, a guarantee according to a prescribed form approved by the House Committee, shall be signed by a respectable householder.

Patients, except in cases of extreme destitution, are required, when admitted into the Hospital, to bring with them a change of linen and a towel, also a cup, saucer, and spoon, and a knife and fork, which articles will be returned to them on their discharge.

Out-patients presenting themselves for the first time are required to attend half an hour before the time fixed for the attendance of the Medical Officers, for the purpose of having their names registered.

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
