TEUCRIUM MARUM VERUM

Introduction

Some authors consider Teucrium to be a well proved remedy. But it is an infrequently used remedy. 'Irritability when too much medicine has produced an oversensitive state when remedies fail to act' is the rubric found in Kent's Repertory which draws the attention of Homoeopaths as to how useful this remedy could be in some patients. It is prescribed by practitioners when there is H/O worms in patients, without considering other symptoms. Even when prescribed on this indication it seems to be helping a number of individuals. It was decided to systematically work with some cases to verify symptoms described in the materia medica and to add some clinical symptoms

Method

64 patients where Teucrium was prescribed on some indications were studied. Only those cases were selected for study where Teucrium was the first prescription. The compounder was instructed to give placebo instead of Teucrium in about 5 cases and encircle the prescription. This was to keep a check on the placebo effect. It was decided to administer Teucrium to the same patients later and observe them. A complete drug picture of Teucrium was compiled from various books of materia medica and the symptoms were compared with this drug picture from the cases where Teucrium had worked. Clinically found symptoms were graded as follows-Grade I=a symptom found in 5 or more than 5 patients. Grade II=a symptom found in 3 or more than 3 patients.

Conclusion

1. Teucrium seems to change our concept of the

life cycle of some parasitic worms. The nose is not described in the life cycle of Enterobius vermicularis and Trichuris trichura. Teucrium is an important medicine for nasal polyps and nasal irritation is common with worms.

- 2. Cina and Teucrium resemble each other to a great extent. Irritability is present in Cina as well as Teucrium. It is important to differentiate the two.
- 3. Tubercular diathesis gives rise to helminthic infestation. Teucrium seemed to help patients with P/H or F/H of tuberculosis and also helped patients with cervical lymphadenitis, primary complex and actual pulmonary tuberculosis. Clarke writes about the use of Teucrium in the treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis. This was confirmed. Incidentally, this remedy is not listed under "Phthisis Pulmonalis" in Kent's repertory.
- 4. Some symptoms which are not listed under Teucrium were clinically found e.g. Leucorrhoea, asthma (Loeffler's syndrome) and other symptoms mentioned under "Observation Table II & III."
- 5. Some symptoms which are not given sufficient importance in the materia medica were found to be important e.g. Change of weather <, < damp weather, > open air and other symptoms mentioned in "Observation-Table IV."
- 6. Tuberculinum and Teucrium resemble each other. In some cases when Tuberculinum did not help, Teucrium helped.
- 7. Laboratory investigations-microscopic examination cannot detect eggs of Enterobius vermicularis. Under the circumstances eruptions around the anal region guides the physician about the presence of worms in the patient.
- 8. Now that we have clinical as well as confirmed importance of the symptoms, this remedy can be used with confidence.
