## HOMEOPATHIC PROPHYLAXIS

The word prophylaxis means the prevention of a disease. Homœopathic prophylaxis means the use of Homœopathic remedies in preventing diseases.

Prevention is better than cure. So Homœopaths should pay more attention to the prevention of diseases. Homœopathy offers a great scope in the field of preventive medicine.

According to Dr. A. H. Grimmer, "Homœopathic prophylaxis never causes anaphylaxis or shock, never results in secondary infection, never leaves in its wake serum or vaccine disease or any other severe reaction; it simply protects surely and gently."

The following are some of the Homœopathic medicines having prophylactic powers:—

Aconite prevents abortion from fright or excitement. —Cowperthwaite.

A dose of Aconite 1 given shortly before passing a catheter will prevent pain if there is any difficulty.—Clarke.

Agnus Castus prevents excoriation from walking.

Ammonium Carbonicum will often abort a recent cold. —Cowperthwaite.

Ammonium formaldehyde, known commercially as Cystogen prevents the decomposition of urine in kidneys and ureters.—Wm. Boericke.

Anagallis Arvensis is . . . employed to prevent injurious effects from the bites of rabid animals.—Blackwood.

I use Apis as a prophylactic against diphtheria.—Pierce. Arnica is a prophylactic of pus infection.—Boericke.

Arnica prevents suppuration and septic conditions. —H. C. Allen.

Arnica prevents post-partum haemorrhage and puer-peral complications.—H. C. Allen.

Arnica given immediately after a blow, fall or physical shock, prevents pain and other ill-effects, local or constitutional.—H. Fergie Woods.

The strong tincture of Arnica applied to a wasp sting, prevents the pain and swelling, and in a couple of hours the sting is forgotten.—M. L. Tyler.

Grauvogl considered *Arnica* as remedy to prevent suppuration and particularly to hinder the absorption of pus and so prevent pyaemia.

Arsenicum is prophylactic against yellow fever.

Baptisia is prophylactic against typhus and typhoid. —A. H. Grimmer.

Baryta Carb not only prevents tonsillitis but also the otitis media that so frequently result from it.—Blackwood.

According to Hahnemann, Belladonna is the most sure preventive of hydrophobia.

Belladonna prevents air-sickness in aviators.

Berberis prevents the recurrence of boils.—Dewey.

In weaning Bryonia is used to prevent engorgement.

"When given in season Calcarea Phosphorica will often prevent marasmus.—J. B. Bell.

Calcarea Renalis prevents the formation of tartar upon the teeth.—Blackwood.

Dr. W. E. Leonard claims that in the 12x Calcarea Sulphurica will abort felons and furuncles.

Calendula prevents suppuration and pain in wounds. —H. F. Woods.

Calendula Tincture 1x diluted with an equal part of water is used to check bleeding and to prevent a wound from going septic.—P. H. Sharp.

Camphor is said to ward off a head cold if given at the time of exposure.—Mills.

Camphoric acid is employed as a prophylactic against catheter fever; also for prevention of night sweats.

Carduus Marianus has the reputation of preventing the further formation of stones.—Karo.

Caulophyllum is a powerful agent for the prevention of premature labour and miscarriage, provided the premonitions are pains of a spasmodic character.—Tyler.

China is used for the prevention of the formation of biliary calculus.—Clarke.

Chionanthus Virginica is said to prevent the formation of gall-stones and promotes the discharge of those already formed—Cowperthwaite.

Cistus Canadensis aborts colds that center in posterior nose.—Boericke.

Cocculus Indicus 12 is used to relieve or prevent the type of sea-sickness characterised by great nausea, vertigo, faintness and loss of orientation.—P. H. Sharp.

Cocculus is said to prevent hernia when a weak feeling in the abdomen indicates that a hernia may take place, though the symptom is probably of a purely nervous character.—Cowperthwaite.

Euphorbia Prostata is employed as prophylactic to snake poison.—Blackwood.

Fluoric Acid will prevent the manifestation of disease (œdema of prepuce) in sycotic subjects, will prevent formation of warts.—Kent.

Fragaria prevents formation of calculi, removes tartar from teeth and prevents attacks of gout.—Boericke.

Gelsemium has also proved prophylactic against 'flu. —Tyler.

Its (of Golondrina) use also renders the body immune to the influence of the snake venom, and thus as a prophylactic. (Indigo).—Boericke.

Helonias Dioica prevents abortions which occur as the result of the slightest overexertion or irritating emotions.

To prevent convulsions, (after bites of mad dogs) give *Hydrophobinum*, evening and morning, every week, until it produces fever, diarrhœa, etc.—*Hering*.

Hypericum prevents lockjaw.-Boericke.

Attacks of even chronic epilepsy, which only occur after mortification or some similar vexation (and not from any other cause) may always be prevented by timely administration of Ignatia.—Hahnemann.

Ilex Aquifolium is said to be of use as a prophylactic against sunstroke.—Boericke.

The remedy Lath. sat, has given the most certain protection in thousands of cases exposed to polio through many epidemics over the last forty years.—A. H. Grimmer.

Ledum is a preventive medicine when an accident happens to the ends of the fingers, if a patient steps on a nail or tack or sticks a splinter under a finger-nail or into the foot. These punctured wounds, rat bites, cat bites, etc., are all made safe by Ledum; i.e., Ledum prevents the shooting pains that naturally come and the nerves will never be involved.—Kent.

Lycopodium is an important remedy early in the case to prevent the formation of renal calculi.—Blackwood.

Lyssin may be used as a prophylactic in hydrophobia.

Malandrinum 30 has been given with great success as a preventive as well as a curative agent against and for variola.—Raue.

Mercurius Cyanatus prevents diphtheria.—H. F. Woods.
Millefolium is preventive in post-partum haemorrhage.
—H. C. Allen.

Morbillinum has been used as a prophylactic against infection by measles.—H. C. Allen.

Mucobacter is a good prophylactic against 'flu.—H. F. Woods.

Nux Vomica 3 may prevent a cold if given early before the commencement of the running of the nose.—Cartier.

Parotidinum has been used as a prophylactic against infection by mumps.—H. C. Allen.

Pertussin is a very valuable and good protection against whooping cough.—A. H. Grimmer.

Petroleum has been employed as a prophylactic against sea-sickness.—Blackwood.

Phosphorus is said to act as a prophylactic and prevent the return of croup.—Cowperthwaite.

Pilocarpine should be used once daily as a preventive against mumps.—Clarke.

Pituitrin is used chiefly for its action on the uterus to check bleeding after delivery.—Boericke.

Podophyllum will often prevent hydrocephaloid when the symptoms accompany profuse, exhausting stools.—Cowperthwaite.

Pulsatilla tones up the uterus and prevents postpartum haemorrhage.—Cowperthwaite.

Pulsatilla is said to prevent whooping cough.—Pulford. Pulsatilla is also preventive of measles, or administered during the disease, it tends to prevent sequelae.—Ruddock.

Pyrethrum is very useful in preventing and relieving the annoyance of mosquitoes, gnats, fleas, and bugs.

Rhus tox is prophylactic against chicken pox.—F. Mackenzie.

Sabbatia Angularis is employed as a prophylactic and cure in autumnal, periodic fevers.—Blackwood.

When employed early Santoninum is believed to have prevented puerperal convulsions.—Blackwood.

Saponaria will often "break up" a cold.—Boericke.

Sarracenia Purpurea is indicated in variola; it aborts the disease and prevents pustulation.—Blackwood.

Silicea is a remedy to prevent boils.—Dewey.

Staphisagria acts also as a prophylactic against styes.

We have, then, in *Sulphur* a true prophylactic of that dreaded epidemic (cholera). It may be used by placing a little *Flowers* of *Sulphur* inside of the stockings, as recommended by Dr. Hering several years ago.—E. A. Farrington.

The administration of the *Tincture* of *Sulphur* will, as our experience proves, act as a *preventive* against small-pox.—*Ruddock*.

Tabacum is employed as prevention for sea-sickness, car-sickness.—H. F. Woods.

Terebinth is recommended as a prophylactic in malarial and African fevers.—H. C. Allen.

Thuja is prophylactic against small-pox.—Boenning.

The strong tincture of *Urtica Urens* applied to a bee sting, prevents the pain and swelling, and in a couple of hours the sting is forgotten.—Tyler.

If Tuberculinum bovinum be given in 10m., 50m., and cm. potencies, two doses of each potency at long intervals, all children and young people who have inherited tuberculosis may be immuned from this inheritance and their resiliency will be restored.—J. T. Kent.

A dose of the 6x trituration of Vaccininum is a "Homœopathic vaccination" having, it is claimed by competent observers far more prophylactic power against small-pox than vaccination.—Boericke and Tafel.

Vaccininum is employed as a prophylactic against, and to modify the course of an attack of small-pox.—Blackwood.

As a preventive of, or protection against, small-pox, *Variolinum* is far superior to crude vaccination and absolutely safe from the sequelae, especially septic and tubercular infection.—*H. C. Allen*.

Viburnum Opulus will prevent miscarriage, if given before the membranes are injured, and when pains are spasmodic or threatening.—Hale.

Dr. Boericke towards the end of his famous Materia Medica gives us the following useful list of PROPHY-LACTICS—

Catheter fever; Camph. ac. Cholera—Ars.; Cupr. ac.; Ver. a. Diphtheria—Apis (30); Diph. (30). Erysipelas—Graph. (30). Hay fever—Ars.; psor. Hydrophobia-Bell.; Canth.; Hyos.; Stram.

Intermittent fever-Ars.; Chin. s.

Measles-Acon.; Ars.; Puls.

Mumps-Trifol. rep.

Pus Infection—Arn.

Quinsy-Bar. C (30).

Scarlet fever-Bell. (30); Eucal.

Apis and merc. are great remedies to ward off, or cure, hydrocephalus after scarlet fever.—Pulford.

With regard to prevention of hydrocephalus Dr. Von. Grauvogl says that in families in which hydrocephalic children have been born he has succeeded in preventing recurrence of cases by single alternate daily doses of Sulphur 6, and Calc. Phos. 6, given to the mother during the term of pregnancy—Ruddock.

The best prophylaxis against an epidemic disease would be the choice of a drug based on the doctrine of genius epidemicus.

As regards the potency to be used Dr. A. H. Grimmer writes that the 10M is a protective potency and the reaction is good at least for that epidemic. That holds good in all the protections that Dr. Grimmer has given—polios and all.

To those who do not admit the use of Homœopathic remedies for prophylaxis, Dr. G. Boericke beautifully states that practically certain Homœopathic remedies do also exert a prophylactic action. Certain symptoms are anticipated, as it were, and assumed to take a certain course—then a remedy which pictures this syndrome can be given with every chance of benefit.

Lastly, we shall do well to remember that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.
