## SOME FURTHER ADDITIONS AND CORRECTIONS TO THE KENT'S REPERTORY

In The Hahnemannian Gleanings, August 1981, I communicated some corrections and additions to the Kent's Repertory. Herewith some further. Sources have also been mentioned.

## Additions:

Page Col. Rubric

- 723 2 LEUCORRHOEA, yellow: Fago. (see symptom 461, 462 and 463 T. F. Allen's Encyclopaedia, vol. IV; Boericke's Materia Medica, p. 281; E. Anshutz: The Homoeopathic Recorder, March 1929).
- 1321 2 ERUPTIONS Urticaria, itching better by perspiring: Rhus tox. (H. C. Allen: The Homoeopathic Recorder, March 1929. Kent has given Rhus tox under "perspiration, during"; J. H. Allen in Diseases and Therapeutics of the Skin, p. 305 has given: "Agg. perspiring: Am. Wrapping up warm after perspiring.").
- 1308 1 SKIN, dry, inability to perspire: Hep. (H. C. Allen: The Homoeopathic Recorder, March 1929, "Entire inability to sweat characterises: Graph., Hep., as well as Alumina.").
- 393 1 SWELLING, cheeks, menses, during: Phos. (Jahr: *The Homoeopathic Recorder*, March 1929: "For swelling of cheeks during menses: Graph., Phos., Sep.").
- PAIN ovaries, left better by flexing thigh and lying partly on 732 side: Lach. ("Finally an incapacitated chronic case and a realization of utter inability to accomplish anything, suggested a homoeopathic consultation. This resulted in the astonishing phenomenon of a swift and marvellous precision in determining a medicine and an equally astonishing and effective recovery. What a revelation in just this! A white, emaciated young woman worn hy lack of sleep and nervous irritation had been invalid many months and for several weeks had been lying partly on the side with the left thigh partly flexed, becoming each week more sensitive and helpless in body and will. With his usual preciseness Dr. Case walked up and placed his finger lightly over the left ovary with the result that students of Lachesis know. A brief story, a few pertinent questions, a powder on tongue and plenty of s.l. for the writer's benefit as well as the patient's-a never-failing determination to learn the marvellous

- 879 2 PURRING feeling in region of heart: Pyrog. ("Sensation of purring of heart: Pyrog." Kent's Materia Medica, p. 816; also H. C. Allen's Materia Medica of Nosodes; Clarke's Dictionary and Boger's Synoptic Key).
- 882 1 WATER, as if the heart pumped cold: Pyrog. (See Kent's Materia Medica, p. 816).
- 242 2 INFLAMMATION, measles, after: Merc. bin. iod. ("For ophthalmia following measles, give Merc. bin. iod." See Case Reports by Dr. E. B. Fanning, The Hahnemannian Gleanings, Jan. 1983).
- 1256 2 WAKING, noise, from slight: Sulph. ("Sulphur has the peculiar cat-nap sleep symptom namely, the slightest noise at night awakes the patient". Farrington's Clinical Materia Medica, p. 362).
- 163 2 PAIN, occiput, lying on back of head: Cocc. (Hering's Guiding Symptoms, vol. iv; also Dr. George von Keller's 'Cocculus' in The British Homoeopathic Journal, April 1980).
- 1321 2 ERUPTIONS, urticaria caused by tar: Bov. ("Some blotches nearly two inches in diameter caused by tar."—Hering's Guiding Symptoms, vol. ii, p. 497).
- 1392 2 PULSATION, lying on right side: Arg. nit. ("The patient throbs all over from head to foot while lying on right side."—Kent's Materia Medica, p. 117).
- 875 2 PALPITATION, heart, lying on right side: Kalmia. ("We have plenty of remedies with palpitation worse from lying on the left side, but remedies with palpitation worse lying on the right side are rare. It is uncommon, strange, rare and peculiar."—Kent's Materia Medica, p. 117).
- 1343 2 NIGHT, midnight, after, 5 a.m.: Nat. c.
- 477 2 APPETITE, increased, night 11 p.m.: Nat. c. 5 a.m.: Nat. c. ("Gets hungry at 5 a.m. and 11 p.m. 5 a.m. is the favourite time for the Nat. carb. aggravation."—Kent's Materia Medica, p. 710. Boger and Bocricke also mention the peculiar 5 a.m. aggravation.).
- 140 1 PAIN, fright, after: Lach. ("Dr. Swift, with Lachesis never failed to cure headache caused by fright.—Homoeopathic Heritage, p. 423, August 1982).
- 273- -1- COLORS, blue, before eyes, before headache: Iris ("Dr. Miller mentioned Dr. Biegler's experience with Iris, as reported by Prof. Lilienthal; Dr. Biegler with this remedy curing nearly all his cases of sick headache when preceded by a blue before the

eyes; when this symptom is absent he finds that the remedy fails.").

1390 2 PARALYSIS, one-sided, spasms of the left side and paralysis of the right: Bell (The Homoeopathic Heritage, p. 425, August 1982; Charles Raue's Special Pathology and Diagnostics with Therapeutic Hints, p. 832).

In his article 'Concerning some of the rare varieties of Expectoration' the great Dr. von Boenninghausen has communicated his "results of many years' careful observations". He has, in the article said: "I, therefore, shall here confine myself to the taste and smell, and also some of the rarer forms of expectoration, concerning which if we properly direct our questions, especially hy considering the individual indications of the patient already known, we shall gain more frequently than might be supposed the most satisfactory statements.

"By far the greater number of them deserve, in a prominent measure, the title of *characteristic*, and I am indebted to many of them since they pointed to remedies more rarely used and which I hardly would have thought of, for the thorough cure of malignant ailments of the chest and neck, which without these characteristics, I could hardly have cured.

"I therefore give in alphabetical order what my experience has taught me, and what I mostly tried myself."

There is no further need to point out the value of the communication of Boenninghausen. We can be sure that they will help us also in curing malignant ailments of the chest and neck.

It is also observed that though almost all these rubrics and remedies are found in the Boger's-Boenninghausen's Repertory there are still some not found in that. For example, the remedies Magnet australis and Vitrum. I therefore give hereunder such of the rubrics which are not in Kent and remedies which should be added to the rubrics in the Kent:
